

Here is a short guide on how to join Brize Norton Parish Neighbourhood Watch Scheme (BZN NHW).

1st Stage

- To join us, first you need to register as an individual member via <u>www.</u> <u>ourwatch.org.uk/join</u>
- You will need to select the 'Thames Valley' area
- During registration, scroll down the page and complete the fields, agree the privacy policy and then click to say you are not a robot.
- You will receive an email with a code to enter on the registration page.
- Complete your registration by filling in the remaining fields.

2nd Stage

- Now that you've registered as an individual member of 'Ourwatch', you can now select to join the scheme.
- In the 'member area' click on 'SCHEME ADMIN' to join a scheme.
- Here you will see a box labelled 'schemes near you', either type in your postcode or select Brize Norton Parish Neighbourhood Watch to ioin our scheme.

 Once you've selected to join the BZN NHW I, as the co-ordinator, will get an email notifying me of new members wishing to join the scheme.

Why join the BZN NHW?

To increase the value of our neighbourliness, inclusivity, community and resilience and be pro-active to help reduce crime and the fear of crime by providing crime prevention advice and acting upon it. The goal is for the scheme to work in partnership with policing, councils and community groups to achieve our goals.

The vision for the BZN NHW scheme is to have numerous Area/Street coordinators working in collaboration with myself as Area Coordinator, ultimately working as a team to develop and manage this project long-term.

The Parish Council and I look forward to residents joining the scheme and Street Coordinators stepping forward, a role which requires no effort, other than being able to speak to your neighbours!

The celebrations didn't end there; with events going on throughout the




weekend including many street parties, we finally had our big Picnic in the Park, and the Flower Festival on Sunday.

There are lots of other ways that we have raised funds - the one the children particularly like is "Break the Rules Day" - needless to say we raise quite a lot on that day! Another fun event was the sale of Krispy Crème's - wow, cannot believe how many people bought those. We run a School Lottery

so anyone who is not part of that can of course talk to us about getting that set up for you - it is quick and easy and you may be a winner.

Our final event of this school year was the Year 6 Prom. This was the first time we have done this, but judging by the comments we

The walking footballers even challenged the humble bumble cafe team to a match (which we very nearly didn't lose!). It was


also a chance to say farewell to Gemma and Toba who many of you will know have worked at the café for

For those who may not have seen the post on social media, here is an update:

We have been informed by Oxfordshire County Council that Brize Norton has been included in the first group of 78 towns and villages that are being considered for a 20mph speed limit. These range from towns such as Bampton, Banbury, Abingdon and Witney to villages such as Aston/Cote, Standlake and Brize Norton.

There is now a second group of 84 towns and villages that follow on after us for consideration and in addition to this, OCC is receiving three new applications each week!

This means that 162 towns and villages in Oxfordshire have applied for the 20mph scheme and the number is growing weekly Your Parish Council look forward to liaising with officers from OCC to discuss which areas in our Parish can be included in this scheme.

Mary Ellis Country Park & Kilkenny Lane Country Park



Many of you have been making use of our lovely Mary Ellis Country Park, still in its infancy but now beginning to show us a hint of what it will look like once it has matured.

Although some of the recently planted trees are not looking their best, and the Parish Council has addressed this with Bloor Homes, the wildflowers and grasses are looking good and will only improve as time goes by. The mown paths will become a feature, mirroring those in Kilkenny Lane Country Park.

We will see the area continue to mature over the next year, hopefully encouraging more wildlife back, and we hope that the team at WODC who are currently undertaking a habitat restoration project at Kilkenny Lane Country Park, will set up a conservation group in the Mary Ellis Country Park too.

We do ask that while the park and it's plants, trees and wildflowers are in their infancy, please do stick to these pathways where possible and help maintain it's cleanliness by picking up after your dog and taking any litter home.

Please be aware that any foil based litter when left can cause fire, so again, please be very vigilant in taking this home.





The Kilkenny Lane Country Park Conservation Group has had a successful first couple of sessions – volunteers have been tackling vegetation in and around the site's balancing ponds, and surveying the site's wildflower meadows to start a longer term monitoring programme of the grasses.

The group meets on the last Wednesday

of every month at 10am, and carries out tasks such as coppicing, litter-picking, tree guard removal and wildlife surveying.







- 4. Cream marg/butter till light and fluffy add eggs one at a time with some flour until all combined.
- 5. Divide between lined tins level and bake for 28 to 30 minutes until golden and springs back when pressed.

- 200grams softened Marg/butter
- 200grams self-raising flour
- 4 medium eggs
- 1 teasp baking powder
- Jam

6. When cooled completely sandwich together with the jam and decorate to theme of show.




'The Companions of the Crow' and the MF Dance company.

SCARECROW competition rules

The organising committee of the Brize Norton 'Kings and Queens' themed Village Bash

2022 welcomes entries from residents and those living outside the parish to make and display a 'Regal' scarecrow.

Families may enter more than one scarecrow. Ideally the scarecrow should be displayed in their garden location from Sunday 4 September to advertise the Village Bash. We ask that they are then brought to the event on Sunday 18 September at 1pm for judging and the chance to win a prize. Judges' decisions are absolutely final. Prize winners will be announced and presentations made at the Village Bash about 4.30pm. Competitors are responsible for displaying their scarecrows at the event and are responsible for clearing away their own scarecrow by 5.30pm.

The scarecrow can be smaller but should not be larger than 2.0m wide x 2.0m high. All scarecrows should be constructed to consider the prospect of inclement weather. Entrants are reminded that this is a public event and all scarecrows must be made and displayed in good taste. The Committee reserve the right to withdraw any scarecrows that they deem unsuitable. An entrant designing their scarecrow to cause deliberate offence will be disqualified.

Scarecrows should be placed in a safe location and should be clearly visible from the road. They should be secured so that they will not blow away, and in a position that will not cause a danger, injury, or annoyance to others. The organising Committee will not be held responsible for any damage to Third Party property caused by the creation or insecurity of scarecrows. Owners are held solely responsible for the safety and security of their scarecrow.

Photographs will be taken of the scarecrows and may be published on the Brize Norton Parish website to advertise the Village Day or used for other purposes after the event.





· · · The Countryside, on horseback



I have been lucky enough to enjoy horse riding in some fantastic locations across the United Kingdom. Pony trekking in Scotland, endurance rides across Ashdown Forest in East Sussex, many holidays in the New Forest Hampshire, and a real highlight was keeping my horse of a lifetime near Windsor Great Park.

I have lived in Brize Norton for 17 years and have kept my horses in the local area for all that time. We are very fortunate to have some excellent off-road riding in the form of bridleways but unfortunately most of those are dissected by roads, and therefore we can't escape the traffic completely.

Brize Norton has several stables and livery

yards nearby, but there are not that many bridleways to ride on. The village is lucky to have an excellent equestrian facility where lots of competitions are held in the form of Lower Haddon Livery.



I spend most of my time riding near Hailey and we have benefitted recently from some work by the council to improve a bridleway and the local British Horse Society Access Representatives have worked hard to preserve the bridleway's status because some new houses are planned for an adjoining field. The most exciting time for

riding in Hailey is during the village's scarecrow competition when I am convinced that the residents are trying to finish me off by leaving scary exhibits with a ton



of bunting all over the place that freak out the horses!

I am fortunate to have access to the Eynsham Estate for riding and that is a



truly special place with lovely long grass tracks for cantering in the dry season and hard tracks for the winter too. The bluebells in spring are phenomenal. You have to dodge the occasional

sheep, but it all adds to the adventure.

Horse riding is a popular hobby locally, and if you do happen upon a horse rider on the roads the British Horse Society has a recent safety campaign to promote horse and rider welfare that is worth a look

Dead Slow | Road Safety Campaign | British Horse Society (BHS). The message is please pass horses wide and slow. It's

As I left Brize one midsummer evening...

Those of you who know me will have seen my 4 x 4 with ladders on the roof leaving the village on a summers evening and may have wondered 'where is he off to?'.



Well, I shall explain, I am off to ring and record barn owls.

The barn owl Tyto alba is a bird of myths and legends and has

appeared in many folk tales.

Most of us only see it as a ghostly white shape drifting across the fields and hedgerows at dusk or dawn.

It was in serious decline for many years in West Oxfordshire. This was due to many reasons but the primary ones were lack of suitable nest sites and habitat to hunt over.

The barn owl project was established many years ago to try and reverse this decline and has succeeded in many respects. It is overseen by the Oxford Ornithological Society.

What the project does is to build and install owl nest boxes at suitable sites in the area and then to monitor the use of these boxes over time.



Barn owls nesting in the boxes will be recorded and the young will be rung with a metal band on their leg that has a unique number on it.

If the owl is subsequently captured, or more likely passes away and the ring is read, valuable information about the birds travel and longevity can be ascertained.

The two biggest causes of death for owls that reach adulthood are road accidents, as

they often collide with high sided vehicles on country lanes and drowning, as they are sometimes found in cattle troughs. Once they have fallen in to one of these they find it very difficult to extricate themselves.

Due to this an adult owl doesn't have a long lifetime with the average span being 3-4 years.

When the young are first hatched they are covered with a soft white down which over the next 5-6 weeks is replaced by their

adult feathers and during this time the familiar heart shaped face will appear.



Of course, we do not only find Barn owls in the boxes and often find other birds such as jackdaws Corvus monedula and stock doves Columba oenas have taken up residence. Occasionally other raptors such as kestrels Falco tinnunculus will be found in the box.

Mammals too are found and on a recent check on a box I had five grey squirrels exit the box, rapidly running over my head and shoulders in the process.

The winter months will be taken up with making replacement boxes and visiting our boxes to remove debris and accumulated rubbish from them.

Whereas the owls merely drop a layer of pellets into the box, which over a few years can create a layer a foot or more deep, jackdaws and squirrels will completely fill the boxes with twigs and leaves which all need removing.

So now you know where my car is heading when you see me driving out in the evening!

A new job in late middle age prompts reflection, especially when that job is to represent 2,500 people across varied rural communities.

I grew up in comfort in West Sussex, in a family that had prospered in the industrial age. My great-grandfather came from a Yorkshire family whose building firm had constructed, among other things, the sewers of Bradford in the 1840s. He took the firm alobal, and eventually made his fortune finding oil in Mexico just before the first world war. I used to be embarrassed, as a green-minded person and subsequently a Green Party candidate, that I am here because of oil. But that was the beginning and now we have come to the end of the oil age, we need the same level of ingenuity employed by those Victorian industrialists in order to make the transition to a fossilfuel free economy. Many measures include rapid decarbonisation; less rushing about, a greater sharing of resources and respect for the other species we share our world with. These can also lead to happier, more peaceful and fulfilling lives.

I studied English at Oxford from 1977 to 1980, taught in Africa for a year, then spent six years as a journalist on the Economist and the Independent, before moving to Jamaica in 1988.

Living on an island sharpened my environmental awareness. It's industries destroyed some of the island's most beautiful interiors, and although iridescent fish swam to the beaches, the owners of the glass-bottomed boats could tell that the coral reefs were suffering. As in many communities, the older generations often had answers and they helped restore methods I was only just discovering, such as composting, reuse, upcycling.

When I came back to England with two small daughters in 1997, I found myself drawn to West Oxfordshire. I purchased Asthall Manor when it was in need of a little tender, love and care and now its garden is a place of welcome and retreat, growing food for a local crop share and restoring habitats, while also organising sculpture exhibitions.

Until this year, my closest link with Brize was as a frequent customer of AK Timms! However, I have since enjoyed talking to the Parish Council, as well as many passionate villagers.
